



Bledlow Ridge Cricket Club

Following a challenging season - one of the most rain-affected in memory - our 1st XI will play in Div 4a of the Cherwell league next year while the 2nd XI had some fine victories in the latter part of the season, finishing 6th in Div 6a.



Both teams defeated high ranking opposition on the last Saturday of the league season. The evening's end-of-season celebrations included a presentation to Charlie Carter whose many hours spent working voluntarily on our ground is largely responsible for its reputation as one of the best of the league's 86 clubs. We are trying to improve it even more: the whole ground has just been scarified and will be reseeded in October when we will be asking visitors to keep off the area for a few weeks.

The year has seen considerable development in other respects. The new fencing around the ground, added to Chairman Dave Wells' work getting sponsors to advertise, has created a smart new look and generated commercial opportunities. The Friday night barbecue team has once again been magnificent, offering a wide range of fare and on Junior Awards night, a hog roast. Following these awards, a new plaque was unveiled on the pavilion commemorating Reginald Johnston's gift of Meadow Styles Playing Fields to the village in 1954. Ex-Chairman Mike Beattie had researched this history and he introduced Peter Malaure who gave a fascinating and witty speech describing how he had played on the old ground next door and how he built the first ever cricket practice net at our current location.

The Junior section has thrived again under the guidance of Oli White and his team of committed coaches. There are some very talented young players coming through and several as young as 14 years old have played with considerable success in the league.

Two of our ladies, Molly Carter and Tilly Fellows have represented the Bucks senior ladies' team with Molly selected to play in a "Best of the Best" match. Both have done well enough to be invited to a trial with Southern Vipers. Tilly was awarded the James Goodband 'HairBear' Trophy as our club's outstanding junior cricketer this year.

A club like ours relies hugely on its volunteers and in addition to those referred to above, is grateful to the likes of James Hickey and to those who have umpired and scored during the season.

Nature Notes

Deer made wavering trails through wheat, sometimes you would see their ears floating above the sea of gold. After a last flurry of harvesting we saw hares instead loping across the stubble.

One afternoon an adult fox, fur a deep red brown, stalked a pheasant - bird scurried off protesting loudly, fox gave up, trotted off to sit in a sunny spot. A long green grass snake slithered through our pond, we still have fish so it must have been hunting frogs or newts. Ivy bushes hum with bees, red admiral butterflies flit and float alighting on the flowers to join the feast. Geese are on the move - how wonderful to hear their haunting calls as they fly overhead, it's a sign that autumn approaches.





Waffle Recipe

From Bianca at The Clubhouse Cafe

Ingredients 335g plain flour 1.5Tbsp caster sugar I Tbsp baking powder 3/4 tsp salt 125g of butter 625ml milk 1/2 tsp vanilla extract 1.5tsp lemon juice 4 medium free range eggs

- Melt your butter and pop it on the side so it can have a think about life and the universe while you
- 2. Mix the 335g flour with the 1.5Tbsp caster sugar, 1.5T baking powder and 3/4tsp salt together in a bowl big enough to hold the batter.
- Pour your 625mls of milk, I/2tsp vanilla extract and I.5tsp lemon juice into the bowl with the flour and get your whisk out! We hand whisk... it seems overkill to get the electric whisk out...plus it makes for a good upper body workout. Whisk until you have a mainly smooth batter...then
- 4. Add your beautiful eggs... and whisk again
- 5. Add the melted butter... and whisk again ... by now it should resemble a silky, glossy, lumpless batter. Set it aside and get out your waffle machine, which may or may not have been languishing in a cupboard waiting for THIS moment! Plug it in..... wait until it is hot.We cook

ours on 4-4.5 but you'll have to figure out what works for yours!

"I recommend waiting around 15 mins to use the batter - it seems to thicken up and work best after this time."

6. Pour your rested waffle mixture into the machine. You probably need less waffle mix than you think to go in.

"Wait for the waffle to cook! Our waffle machine beeps at us when it is ready. Hopefully yours has a similar way of telling you it is done... it might be a bit of trial and error initially.. you'll figure it out... I believe in you!"

 Take out your waffle... you can eat them plain (a dusting of icing sugar works well) or top them with whatever classic or crazy toppings your heart desires. We won't judge!

"Try to wait till they have cooled long enough that the steam inside doesn't burn the roof of your mouth! (harder than it sounds.)"

Obituary For Dorothy Sinfield 1932 – 2023

On July 27th 2023 a service to celebrate the life of Dorothy Sinfield was held at St Botolph's, followed by committal in the same grave as her husband Les. Together at last.

Dorothy had been the organist at St. Botolph's for many years until her lack of mobility prevented her from coming regularly to the church. She played for all the services, including weddings and funerals, for as long as she could. Les was the verger for as long as she lived and this lovely couple were stalwarts of St. Botolph's for many years. They could be depended upon come rain or shine. I recall their trudging through the snow after the midnight service to get to their car on Christmas morning; they were in their eighties and determined ! Dorothy would come to the church during the week to practise the hymns for the following Sunday. She loved this responsibility and performed it well. In addition to serving as the organist she was an expert needlewoman and helped to keep the vestments and altar hangings free from holes. These activities gave her enormous pleasure, and the parochial church council remembers her service with immense gratitude. Thank you, Dorothy, we miss you.

News From St. Botolph's

We are disappointed to have to cancel the Harvest Supper for this year. There is too much work going on in the chancel for us to contemplate such a function for now. We hope to provide an alternative when the plastering is finished.

Update:- In November 2021, St. Botolph's was able to use the generous funds donated by the Friends of St.Botolph charity to undertake a major repair of the church stonework. The main aim was to prevent water escaping from cracked drainpipes and roofing tiles, and damaging the plaster underneath. This was successful. Now, using the same funds collected together by the late lvor Herbert, we have embarked on a replastering of the inside of the nave and choir affected by the water seepage. With the welcome assistance of Libby Watts of Liberty Rose Architects and Dave Smith-

plasterer, the work is continuing well and visitors may have come across plastic sheeting and scaffolding in the choir area. Unfortunately, in the 1980's the walls had an unwelcome coat of emulsion paint and this, which does not allow the historic walls to 'breathe', has also caused damp problems.

CLOCK APPEAL – The church has successfully started a JUST GIVING page. This is to collect funds to repair the old sixteenth clock. So far the campaign has been very successful with over 740 pounds given and money also given by Bradenham Parish Council towards a total bill of 3400 pounds – with thanks to all who have so generously contributed. 

There was a great atmosphere inside the hall, particularly during the auction of produce and exhibits that followed the judging, where the slightest bodily twitch was taken as a sign of a bid! Very well done to all of the organisers and participants for making it such a success. The Annual Show is in many ways the epitome of the sort of event that can bring the local community together and the Village Hall Committee will continue to try to facilitate this and other events over the coming months and years. That said, "the road to hell is paved with good intentions" and our efforts to hold an event screening the Last Night of the Proms was severely disrupted by the unilateral decision by our internet service providers (ISP) to get out of that business less than a week before the event was due to take place, which in turn put a pause on any publicity until we could be confident of being able to hold it successfully. Thanks to Simon Digby's sterling efforts, we were able to secure an alternative ISP slightly earlier than anticipated and get the Smart TV and sound systems back up and running 8 days before the event. We are also particularly grateful to Noel Billington for his kind donation of a sound bar to go with the Smart TV, which significantly enhanced the quality of the audio. We hope to make more use of the TV and sound system at coming events and to secure the addition of a FreeSat capability to augment and provide a back-up to the internet service.



West Wycombe - HP14 3AP

Tales of days gone by West Wycombe in 1920s

This is a snippet from talk the late Angela Martin nee Carey presented to the WI twenty years ago. Her family kindly let us share with you all.

I was born in Gerrards Cross. We came to West Wycombe in 1925. No electric light, mains water or sewerage. We had oil lamps and candles for bedtime, oil cooking and a range. The copper had to be filled and lit about two hours before washing could begin and baths were filled from this copper also. We had a pump in the garden for water and every morning someone had to pump the tank full for the day's supply. In time of drought (I believe 1929 was a bad year), Father had to go with yoke and bucket to the field opposite and pump from the cattle trough as this was nearer the river Wye.

We had cesspits emptied by the Council every two to three months (a smelly business), but we were better off than the village and school who had bucket toilets emptied at night by Mr. Mawes, a local farm labourer. He also pumped the organ in St. Paul's church on Sundays

Shops - there were far more shops then than now, as you would expect. Reg Stone had a wireless and bicycle business to the left of the Blackboy Yard. Reg would recharge our accumulator for a few pence and mend our bicycles. His sister, Mrs Trinder, kept the post office on the corner of the Swan Yard.

Next to the Apple Orchard lived Mr. Lee the saddler with his daughters. They supplied saddles and horse collars which hung outside the shop on large hooks. They also mended our boots and shoes. The Library moved house several times - Steps

House, also home to the District Nurse and Midwife, and also for some time in the Blackboy Yard. Colin Marshall's shop used to be two. Martins and Meads. Meads was the grocer and the bakery was at the right hand side of the present shop. The butchers, Edmonds, were at the Apple Orchard. Later, when Stockton's came, they moved to where Trout's are now. Papers came from Newell's who kept the shop and garage at the Pedestal. Len Newell delivered papers and paraffin in a car that had a pram-type roof and running boards that we stood on for a ride up the road. Katie's was the sweet shop and performed the ritual of always presenting the farthing tray, followed by the halfpenny tray and penny tray before you were allowed to make a choice.

In the summer I could supplement my pocket money, probably unknown to my

mother, by shutting the golden ball on St. Lawrence church (then open to the public). You had to climb up the tower and then ascend the iron ladder and get the flap swinging until the final push would shoot the bolt into the too rung of the iron ladder. It took about three to four of us to push the ball trap door shut. We were never short

of things to do. In summer we picked wild strawberries, raspberries, blackberries and wild flowers and climbed trees.

We also went sledging down the hill. The houses in Church Lane had sheds where the flowerbeds are now, and for 2d. You could hire a sledge for the afternoon if you didn't possess your own. They were made from chair runners and had an upholstered seat and a piece of string to hold on to. We rubbed the runners with paraffin oil to make them slippery and shot off down the Steep from as far as you dare.

Just after starting school at five years old there was a very bad epidemic of diphtheria and the school was closed. Two boys died. I caught the justly feared disease and was taken by ambulance to Booker Isolation Hospital where I spent six weeks.

School was ruled over by Gaffer (Mr. Belsham) and Sodry (Mr. Saunders) the deputy head. We had three playgrounds, Boys, Girls and Infants. We played all the games, which came round in cycles, hopscotch, skipping, tiles, five-stones, tag etc. Games and races were played on a flat piece dug out of the hillside, but more serious stuff was played on the flat at the top of the hill by the churchyard.

We did the maypole for Empire Day (May 24th) usually on the Pedestal Field, but sometimes in Dashwood's Park. Gaffer would sort out the ribbons, which usually became entangled before the end of the performance with lots of shouting, and Sodgy played the piano.



Radnage Charity – Here To Help Our Children

Families recently arrived in Radnage may like to give thought to how their children might benefit from the really rather special benevolent institution that has supported village life for more than 500 years.

Few similar bodies, originally set up to help the poor, and thereby known as poor's charities, have been able to survive and adapt to the major social changes over the centuries. By contrast the Radnage Charity – full name Radnage Poor's Land Estate – has not only survived but thrived.

Through good management, and with the benefit of endowments of money and land, this almost unique organisation – without having to fundraise – has the charitable purpose of spending its income (from land rents and invest-ments) in three ways: (1) assisting those in need, hardship, distress or poor health; (2) financing the maintenance and repair of the 12th century Church of St Mary the Virgin; and (3) supporting children and young people in edu-cation up to the age of 25.

Just in the five years since I have been the clerk to the trustees, educational grants have not only added to the village school's resources in various ways not otherwise funded, but have been made to numerous schoolchildren and students in further and higher education.

Grants have contributed to the need for books and computers, for living ex-penses

away from home, and for courses, camps, sporting events and over-seas travel.

Funds for such purposes are waiting to be awarded. Asking for support is not asking for charity! It is the charity itself that is asking families to apply.

It is a simple process. The child or older student – with parental help if nec-essary – should write (the old-fashioned way) to me, setting out the educa-tional purpose for which a contribution could make all the difference. Do this in good time, as the trustees meet only four times a year, although urgent requests can also be considered.

Parents: encourage your children to take this initiative in their own futures, to thereby gain the satisfaction of making a personal contribution to achieving their individual ambitions.



Note from Archdeacon

In the 'Where do we go from here' meeting with all the Churchwardens and selection panel members, including Associate Archdeacon of Buckingham Canon Chris Bull, Wycombe Deanery Lay Chair Caroline Sants and one of our patrons Revd Graham Archer. The meeting was very constructive and offered several ideas for the way ahead to sustain everyone and to make progress.

Following the meeting, Archdeacon Chris and Caroline joined in writing the following supportive statement.

We were all very disappointed with the news that there had been no applicants to the newly advertised full time, interim role at West Wycombe benefice. The team of church wardens and representatives on the panel have worked so hard, both to make progress in the benefice during the long vacancy but also to prepare an excellent profile which we believe does full justice to this benefice, of which we are so fond. The meeting scheduled for shortlisting applicants was nevertheless held but became instead a discussion of why there were no responses and what we can do to help move things forward.

In answer to the first question, Graham Archer from CPAS, one of the patrons of the benefice, shared his perspective from being involved in similar processes up and down the country. Indeed, he had graciously travelled a very long distance to be with us, for which we were so grateful. He explained that at the moment there were relatively few clergy moving so the 'market' was very quiet. This was in part because a lot of movement took place after Covid and lockdown, but also that people might be waiting to see how the discussion about Living in Love and Faith settles in the end. This underlined what we all know in our heart- that there is nothing 'wrong' with your parishes, but rather that this frustrating process is being played out in many parishes across the country.

So – what next? The unanimous conclusion of the group was to recommend that the advertisement be repeated as soon as possible. Having received feedback that the originally advertised half time post was not sufficient to cover four parishes, this fulltime post is completely new, and therefore this would only be the second time of advertising – which is not unusual either within Wycombe deanery or in the wider church. Of course, we shall all continue to pray, and to trust that this process will end with the person God has prepared for you sending in their application, and all this waiting and frustration finally making sense.

It is so hard to see the extraordinary hard work and resilience of the clergy, wardens, PCCs and congregations of your parishes meet with such a disappointment, and we all share in that sadness and frustration. Nevertheless, Wednesday's meeting seemed full of hope and determination, and as representatives of the diocese and deanery we are committed to doing everything we can to help during the vacancy and, of course, bring it to an end with a successful appointment.


