


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Letter from your church

Ascension Day was always one of the highlights of the school year at St John's Church of England School in Aylesbury. Were we mixed infants enthused by the triumphal return of Jesus following his glorious resurrection, the trials of his earthly life, the agonies of his final days and his crucifixion? Were we just excited by theology, wondering whereabouts heaven was and how far in the upward direction it was to be located? no. Ascension Day meant going into the adjacent church (sadly no more) for the service (was it called mass, eucharist or simply holy communion) and then having the rest of the day off.

I don't know that the service was ever explained to us. We were given rather scruffy booklets to follow it from which were not at all helpful. There was certainly nothing so advanced as us being allowed up to the communion rail for a blessing. I don't know that the event made any spiritual impact on anyone else, although for me, who otherwise had never been introduced to a church, the building itself, not ancient but Victorian and red brick, spoke very powerfully of mystery, of something quite different from the ordinary, solid, matter-of-fact world, a feeling which lay dormant for me for several years until I got to university and discovered more about the God who is the source of mystery and inspires this sense of awe. I've always thought that a church building should be a place where we encounter mystery and feel awe and wonder which we then take back into rest of our lies.

But what of Ascension itself? Is this the moment when Jesus says good bye to his friends, and departs for heaven, which as we all know is the place that you can't get to from here with a rather nebulous promise of a Holy Spirit? No it isn't. On the contrary, this is the point at which Jesus demonstrates that , because of what he has done, the worlds of earth and heaven are joined together - just watch as Jesus passes from one to the other. Our prayers and our worship go directly there, and as we remember at Pentecost, the Holy Spirit comes to us to empower us in our lives and our witness for him.

News from St Paul's Church

Easter was celebrated at St Paul's church in what has become our traditional way with daffodils on the cross at the gate announcing to everyone passing by the joyful message of Christ's resurrection. And inside we sang Alleluia and thanked God for all he had done to win for us the promise of forgiveness and his presence with us always, both here and in eternal life with him. The Easter Garden remained around the base of the font throughout the month for all our visitors to see and be reminded of the Easter message.



On 9th May at St Botolph Bradenham at 6.30pm, we go on to celebrate Jesus' ascension back to the Father, promising to send the Holy Spirit to help us to fulfil his call to go out to all people with is message of love. So, 10 days later again at St Botolph's, on Sunday 19th May at 11.00am, we gather for Pentecost and ask that like those first disciples we may be filled with the Holy Spirit to strengthen and support us as we take our part in spreading God's love.

Our service for this month will be on the fourth Sunday that is 26th May at 10.00am. This will be Trinity Sunday. We have moved from our usual 3rd Sunday to avoid all the problems that can happen when we clash with Off Road runners.

Not so much a lecture, more a presentation: Tai Chi with Lee Welch: At our April meeting, Lee, perfectly dressed in his black embroidered Chinese outfit, began with a performance on our stage of a series of Tai Chi movements accompanied by Chinese music. It was so beautiful, unusual and mesmerising that we all held our breath and you could have heard a pin drop.

Lee went on to explain his personal journey from years of working too hard with anxiety and with his head full of conflicting, negative thoughts until he realised that this obsessiveness was like an 'inside job', that he needed to clear his head and bring himself to the present moment. He was helped by reading a book by Eckhart Tolle, 'The Power of Now' and from there to his first Tai Chi class. The impact was immediate as a new mindfulness entered his life. Originally a form of martial art, tai chi is a centuries old system of slow, controlled movements designed to cultivate a form of power from which spring Ying and Yang – wuji - ultimate nothingness, perspective and balance of mind and body.

We were then told that Tai Chi is better experienced than witnessed, so we began seated while relaxing each of our body parts in turn – feet flat on the ground, palms resting on thighs, head up, chin in, shoulders down, breathing gently in and out through the nose – and an extraordinary air of calm came over us all. We were then all of us on our feet, mirroring Lee as he led us through a series of Tai Chi movements by the end of which I'm sure we all felt an extra flow of energy, the chi within us. We were certainly excited and even more talkative than usual.

Country Notes

Red kites bathed in shallow pools in the fields along Radnage bottom, a sight l've rarely seen. Ungainly on land they used their wings to balance and avoid toppling beak first into the water. Most birds bathe and preen to keep their feathers in tip-top condition so birdbaths in your garden will provide daily entertainment. Goldfinches take dips in the pond all together, safety in numbers, bluetits drench themselves until they look like sodden little rag balls, and the wren is tiny enough to splash about in a roof gutter. Spring brought chiffchaffs and cherry blossom to gladden our hearts, swallows chatter and swoop overhead. By the time our May Contact arrives, swifts will be slicing through the sky their shrill calls heralding the coming summer.

Tales of days gone by Creating a Tourist Attraction

Many people know the infamous history of the Hellfire Caves, but how did these Caves become a well-known tourist destination.


The Caves were first excavated in the mid 18th. Century. They were then more or less closed off for almost two hundred years. It wasn't until the 1950s that Sir Francis Dashwood, a descendant of the original Sir Francis Dashwood who had originally conceived the idea for the Caves, decided to try and open them as a tourist attraction after a visit to the Carlsbad Caverns in New Mexico.

There were large boulders throughout the Caves and the floor was wet and slippery. The first survey revealed that \pounds 5,000 would be needed to shore up the dangerous areas. That would be the equivalent of approximately a quarter of a million pounds today. With just \pounds 50 in the bank himself, Sir Francis asked his father for help. He refused "damned silly idea," but he did agree to lease him the Caves for \pounds I a year.

In 1951, Sir Francis and his friends then began the work of clearing the passages of the giant boulders. That season the Caves first opened and were immensely popular with visitors. They used candles to provide light to find their way down.

The following winter a local blacksmith, Mr. Stallwood, erected steel scaffolding around one side of the Banqueting Hall. When returning to work one day he found the scaffolding half buried due to the collapse of part of the ceiling.

The whole experience left Sir Francis unable to sleep for weeks. After agonising



he decided to try again. After all, making the Caves a success would help bring tourism to the Golden Ball Church and West Wycombe House.

Sir Francis brought a large surplus of Anderson Steel Shelters previously used as air raid shelters during the Second World war. Due to the dangers of the falling chalk, Sir Francis largely did the work himself to create a suitable passage.

The following season attracted the same number of visitors, but there was less to see as a large part of the Caves was closed off for safety reasons. Sir Francis decided to remove the shelters and gate off the Banqueting Hall. He had a near miss when more boulders fell from the ceiling which left him traumatised and unsure about the whole venture.

Then a mining engineer gave Sir Francis the idea of bypassing the Banqueting Hall altogether, by digging a new tunnel around it. Jim Powney, Les Lawrence, and Sir Francis then spent four months digging the 150ft long bypass tunnel, which still exists today.

"One night, arriving back from London, I went down the Caves through the new tunnel and just past it I saw to my horror a huge boulder with a man's coat underneath it. I thought ...'God Almighty Jim has caught it'. In fact, he had nailed a spike into the wall to hang his coat on and the whole wall had then fallen down with the coat, but luckily missing him."

As the years passed the Caves had further financial investment, leading to the installation of electric lights and a café at the entrance. Following on from this a commentary and sound effects were set up, perhaps the first underground "sound and vision" experience in the world.

The Banqueting Hall remained closed off to the public until 1973. The solution to make it safe involved drilling 130ft feet down from the top of the hill into the Banqueting Hall. Wire ropes were lowered down the boreholes and a protective steel canopy was hoisted up. Three hundred stainless steel bolts 10 to 15 feet long and large plates were drilled into the chalk ceiling, thus making the whole Banqueting Hall safe.



One of the first visitors to the Hall in 1974 was William Brooks. He discovered in a lump of chalk coins dating back to 1720. Since 1951, the Caves have had several million visitors from all around the world. A new café was installed in the 1990's.

Recent investment has led to further development with modern LED lighting, wi-fi and CCTV throughout. The Inner Temple has also been reinforced.

The Hellfire Caves have been featured in many television shows and films; these include Silent Witness, Midsomer Murders, Great Expectations, Cruella, Count Dracula and many more. They have also hosted various parties and other events. None of this would have been possible without the energy, vision and determination of Sir Francis Dashwood. It is his voice that can still be heard on the commentary when you visit the Caves.

When Gaming Helped Win WWII

I know I have featured more than one article on the inventions and exploits that came about as a result of WWII and here's yet another one that I couldn't resist. Great inventions like the bouncing bomb, radar and the ingenious codebreaking work done at Bletchley Park are well documented, but what occurred at Derby House in Liverpool is not so well known.

Derby House was the eventual home of WATU (Western Approaches Tactical Unit). As most naval men were at sea the unit was staffed mainly by recruits from the Women's Royal Naval Service (WRNS) whose ages ranged from a tender 17 to 21. Although initially based in Plymouth the unit was moved to Derby House in Liverpool in 1941. This naval unit was led by Captain Gilbert Roberts and the WRNS had the task of monitoring vital shipping crossing the Atlantic and dealing with the German submarines (U boats) that were caus-ing such devastation to us.

During the second world war Britain was reliant on ships crossing the Atlantic

bringing us food, fuel and munitions. The Germans were well aware of this and



ordered their submarines to sink merchant shipping on sight. In the first four months of this action so many allied ships were sunk that it was deemed only a matter of time before Britain was starved into submission.

It also became apparent that the U-boats were so successful because they were hunting together in what became known as 'wolf packs'. A solution was imperative! The huge map room in Derby House plotted the position of convoys in real time, operating like a human GPS system. Unearthed in the 1980's this room is about 80% original.

The newly formed WATU was tasked to formulate defensive convoy tactics. If these tactics worked successfully in wargaming which the girls practised it was believed that they should also work well for real. Some of the WRNS who showed a greater skill in maths and geography etc. were sent into the 'attic' (the largest room in the HQ) to plot anti-submarine tactics using the brown lino and gridlines on the floor as the sea for their wargames. They also talked to visiting naval officers about the latest U-boat manoeuvres which helped them develop these tactics. Using all this information it was now time to prove their theories viable. Although Captain Gilbert Roberts was a great advocate of the benefits of wargaming the director of WATU. Commander-in-Chief Admiral Max Horton was not so convinced.

This is how the 'game' was played. The gridlines on the floor were spaced 10 inches apart representing I nautical mile. Screens were erected with peepholes cut in them to limit vision. The players who controlled the escort ships had to stand behind these screens whilst the players who were the U-boat captains had unrestricted views of the scenario. The players were given two minutes to give their orders to the WRNS who then put these orders into effect on the floor. This method was adopted so people on opposing sides couldn't overhear their opponents decisions. U-boat movements

were chalked in green, blending in with the brown lino on the floor and thus making their moves just about invisible. Escort ship movements were chalked in white for all to see.



The experienced Admiral Max Horton was summoned to play the part of a U-boat Captain, whilst a 19 year old WRN played the part of an allied commander – she 'sunk' him three times in a row! Rather miffed Horton quickly left the room leaving the upset girls to think that this was the end of it all, however next day orders came through that every naval captain coming into Britain had to visit WATU and be trained in anti submarine tactics by these girls – this also



included a certain Prince Philip ie: the late Duke of Edinburgh.

So, although you may not have heard of WATU it played a very important role in the war enabling Britain to survive and win.

News from your Parish Council



Cllr John Carstensen has returned to active duty after a long period of absence due to illness and he is looking forward to serving the Parish Council and our community again.

We still have our lake in the field now populated by ducks - nature takes over! I spent two days working with the jetting team from Buckinghamshire Council. They were extremely helpful and patient – they removed 6000 litres of mud out of the gullies in that area and on the following day they sucked out 12 tanker loads of water. The ground water levels were so high that as fast as they sucked the water out it was refilling the gullies hence we are really grateful to the National Trust and West Wycombe Estate for helping with the flooding issue by digging a trench from behind Kitty's Lodge to the stream - the water now has somewhere to go when the land cannot absorb any more rain.

As I write this in early April it is not raining, and it is actually quite warm – a perfect temperature to use the outdoor green gym equipment installed on the Pedestal Playing Field. It is good to see people making the most of the equipment.

The Community Orchard, which can be accessed through our burial ground by St Paul's Church is just beginning to come to life with the wild flowers that were planted, or seeds sown in 2022. We hope that birds will start using the birdboxes which we also installed. Currently the sheep are in the adjacent meadow so we have had to padlock closed the gate between their field and the Community Orchard as we do not want

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grazing on the emerging wild flowers – they will be allowed in again after the Community Orchard has been cut and baled in September.

We need to remind everyone that the elections for the Police and Crime Commissioner take place on May 2nd – please remember that you will need identification on you to vote.

The list of 19 outstanding items all related to Highways issues has been worked through by Buckinghamshire Council and there are only a couple of things still to do- hopefully by the time I retire at the end of May they too will have been sorted. So often we have complained about Buckinghamshire Council being slow at making repairs, but credit where credit is due and over the last two months they have worked very hard on our behalf



Thank you to everyone who came to our Spring Litter Pick on Saturday 13th April – it is amazing how much rubbish was collected from just within our parish and sadly the majority of it is caused by take away food and drink as well as laughing gas bottles and a few very strange things which could easily have been disposed of at the two recycling centres close to us. We are still waiting to hear from Buckinghamshire Council about our High Street Project which we started work on nearly four years ago – we think they are close to putting it out for public consultation and it is up to everyone who has a view to respond to the consultation.

Looking ahead to June, the Events Team with the support of the National Trust will be part of the official beacon event to commemorate the 80th Anniversary of the D Day landings. I will be commemorating in my own way as I will be visiting the various beaches on a guided tour.

Since the sale of The Church Room our meetings have taken place in West Wycombe Community Library and we will continue to meet here unless we expect more people to attend - for example, the Annual Parish Meeting will be held in the Village Hall.

There is an opportunity for residents of the parish to come to the Annual Parish Meeting on Thursday 23rd May in the Village Hall starting at 8pm. This is not such a formal meeting as our monthly meetings and is an opportunity for people to hear what different organisations within the community are doing, a chance to socially interact and to enjoy the refreshments. We look forward to seeing you there.

The new Clerk/Responsible Financial Officer, Steven Marshall, will be taking over on 1st June and the next issue of Contact will have more from him.
