In each of your parish churches, the PCC, churchwardens and volunteers help to look after all aspects of church life.





Food, food, glorious food - well not quite!. At our May meeting, Helen Foster, Food Supply Manager for OneCanTrust came and told us all about the organisation's amazing charity work.

The Trust's foodbank is based in High Wycombe and delivers to the town and surrounding areas in South Bucks. It is supported by local organisations, Bucks County Council, housing associations and individuals to deliver weekly food parcels to those who need help. To receive such help, clients need to be referred to them. They have up to 350 volunteers and for example delivered 1017 parcels in March 2024 with an average number of people being supported each week of 553, almost half of whom will be children. They receive food donations from various sources, a large proportion from supermarkets, but also from collection points at churches, schools, organisations

and from individual street heroes. Monthly updates are sent out with details of what is needed . In November OneCanTrust was awarded the Kings Award for Voluntary Service. We were thanked for the food brought in by members which was added to our donation.



Nature Notes

Our local blackbird sings a mellow and varied song, not only star of the dawn chorus but also singing during the day. One May morning there was a terrific thunderstorm throughout which he sang heroically. Researchers found that blackbirds' songs become more complex and melodic with age so ours must be a veteran. Woods were vibrant with lime green beech and larch leaves, whitebeam has soft sage green leaf buds which open into the shape of magnolia flowers, and loveliest of all the warm golden green of oak flower tassels with miniature leaves. The weather in spring was rather inclement for butterflies but whenever there was a dry sunny day brimstones, peacocks and orange-tips emerged and in lune we can look forward to a shimmer of adonis blues at Yoesden.

The quinquenial inspection had recently been carried out and the church wardens had received a verbal report from the architect. A written report will follow. It was pleasing that the items identified were within our means, eg refit gutters and clean the pipes, replace The chicken wire in the tower, attend to the lightning conductor. The vestry door, west door and the south door had been treated, and the hinges painted, by Pete Baldwin.

Pete had also dealt with the clock repairers and the repairs will be put in hand as soon as the Diocese has agreed with the plans. Donations specifically for the repair of the clock had been sufficient to cover the costs; the PCC is very grateful to the donors who have made this possible. Thanks Pete and many other supporters for their significant donations to the clock fund. We also would like to thank Pete Baldwin for his care maintaining the churchyard, and with minor repairs.

Women's ministry and worship at the heart of celebration service

Women took centre stage at a special Eucharist service at Christ Church Cathedral to mark 30 years since women were first ordained priests in the diocese.

There were hymns written by female composers, inclduing the debut performance of one written especially for the occasion by Christ Church Precentor the Revd Philippa White. The mass setting and anthem sung during the service and the solo organ pieces at the start and end were also composed by women. Before the service, a quarter peal was rung by 10 women bell ringers.

The afternoon's sermon was also preached by a member of the cohort, the former Archdeacon of Northampton, the Ven Christine Allsopp, and reflected on the important and prominent role of women in the bible such as Mary Magdalene, as the Apostle to the Apostles. She said: "Women are called not in spite of their gender, not in spite of who they are, but because of it."

While women could be ordained as deacons from 1987, it was not until later

that they were able to become priests permitted to celebrate sacraments such as Holy Communion. The first ordinations of women in the Diocese of Oxford took place on 16 and 17 April 1994 in Abingdon, High Wycombe, Reading, Banbury and Buckingham. Many of those first 67 women were present to lead the way for their peers once again, this time in the form of heading the procession of clergy into the Cathedral at the beginning of the service.

The occasion also served as a broader celebration of women in the Church of England. The service was led by the diocese's first female Bishop, the Rt Revd Olivia Graham, Bishop of Reading; while the first female Dean of Christ Church, The Very Revd Professor Sarah Foot, served as liturgical Deacon. The additional liturgical roles in the service were also played by women priests from around the Diocese,

or by those currently training for their ordination.





From Brown To Bond - A Yorkshire Tale:-

Most farmers will be aware of David Brown (DB) tractors. Even if you're not a farmer or have never heard of David Brown you should find the following ar-ticle of interest.

David Brown started out manufacturing gears in the 1860's at his factory in Meltham, a town in the Calder Valley of Yorkshire not far from Huddersfield. At that time his company was the largest producer of machine-cut gears in the world. By the 1930's his grandson David Brown Ir was running the firm and started producing tractors for the farming community. As this business began to flourish WWII started and the scarcity of materials made things look perilous for the tractor trade. A stroke of genius saw David Brown starting to manufacture a towing tractor for heavy bombers such as the Lancaster & Wellington. This led to a commission from the Air Ministry enabling him to keep the agricultural side afloat. As well as tractors towing the bombers the firm also manufactured the gears that were put into Spitfires & Hurricanes – thus remotely

having a part in the outcome of the Battle of Britain. Of course the German Luftwaffe was well aware of this and having bombed the London factories out of existence turned their attention to Meltham Mills, but luckily



they couldn't find it. Apparently the nearest to the works they got was a chicken factory close by – locals woke up the next morning thinking it had snowed because everywhere was covered in a carpet of white feathers! At the end of the war a report cited the DB factory as one of the reasons for the UK winning – alongside the attack on Pearl Harbour & Hitler's decision to invade Russia.



His interest in these cars led to a win in the 1959 Le Mans race and

the Aston Martin DB5 being used by non other than James Bond. His 'Gadget Car' was seen in the film 'Goldfinger'. However David Brown wasn't too bothered about the success of all this as at the time his tractor business was still flourishing and making him a rich man.

The original gear company survives today albeit under new ownership and in a new

factory at Park Works Huddersfield. Having, many moons ago, tak-en over the Lancashire firm of Harrison, McGregor & Guest Ltd due to their agricultural interests the company badge was changed to reflect the



two counties. This still remains but the tractor & car companies were sold off in the 1970's due to financial losses. Even so the DB name still lives on in the Aston Martin marque.

Your Parish Council was created in 1987 and Cllr Mrs Vicki Smith has been a Councillor since that date and for over 30 years was also the Chairman. Over the years other residents have come forward to be elected as Parish Councillors and it can be a thankless but rewarding task.

Since its creation the Parish Council has been responsible for, and in the majority of cases, paying for, all the footway lighting in Chorley Road, Bradenham Road and Church Lane; the zebra crossing in the High Street and the Pelican Crossing in West Wycombe Road; the footway from the High Street up towards the entrance to the small car park; the burial ground; the Community Orchard; the allotments; the Pedestal Playing Field; all the road safety work along the Bradenham Road by going to the parliamentary select committee for Hs2: the two Vehicle Activated Speed Signs on Chorley Road, the Speed sign on the corner of the Oxford Road; the Mobile Vehicle Activated Sign on the entry to the High Street (currently with the

> manufacturers); the bollards to help residents have a good vision splay at Copperfields; getting some of the grass cut within the 30 miles per hour speed limit areas; the most frequently used footpaths kept clear; parking restrictions outside our shops (sadly not visited enough by non existent Traffic Wardens); Christmas tress planted and lit; lubilee mugs for the all the children at the school and the pre school and many other smaller things like dog waste bins and litter bibs and constantly nagging Wycombe District Council when it existed and always Buckinghamshire Council to ensure that street lighting is working, litter bins are emptied, pavements are swept, potholes are repaired and all are waste bins are collected. There are many other smaller things which could be added to the list including raising objections and concerns when planning applications come in - so many of the issues we thought would become a problem on some of the developments have come to fruition – but we tried.

It has been a most rewarding and satisfying experience working as Clerk with the Parish Councillors on all the above projects but also frustrating at times as legislation can often hold things up by a considerable amount of time. If you do not live in a parished area there is no one looking after your best interests.

The new Clerk/Responsible Financial Officer, Steven Marshall, will be taking over on 1st June and the next issue of Contact will have more from him. Steven has retired from a career in educational management; his last position being as a Bursar of an Oxford University College. Steven already has extensive knowledge of clerking for a Parish Council.


